The Oklahoma Alliance for Recovery Residences launched as the state affiliate of NARR in January 2020. From 2020 to 2023 the number of individuals experiencing homelessness in Oklahoma City with substance use concerns has dropped by 47%.



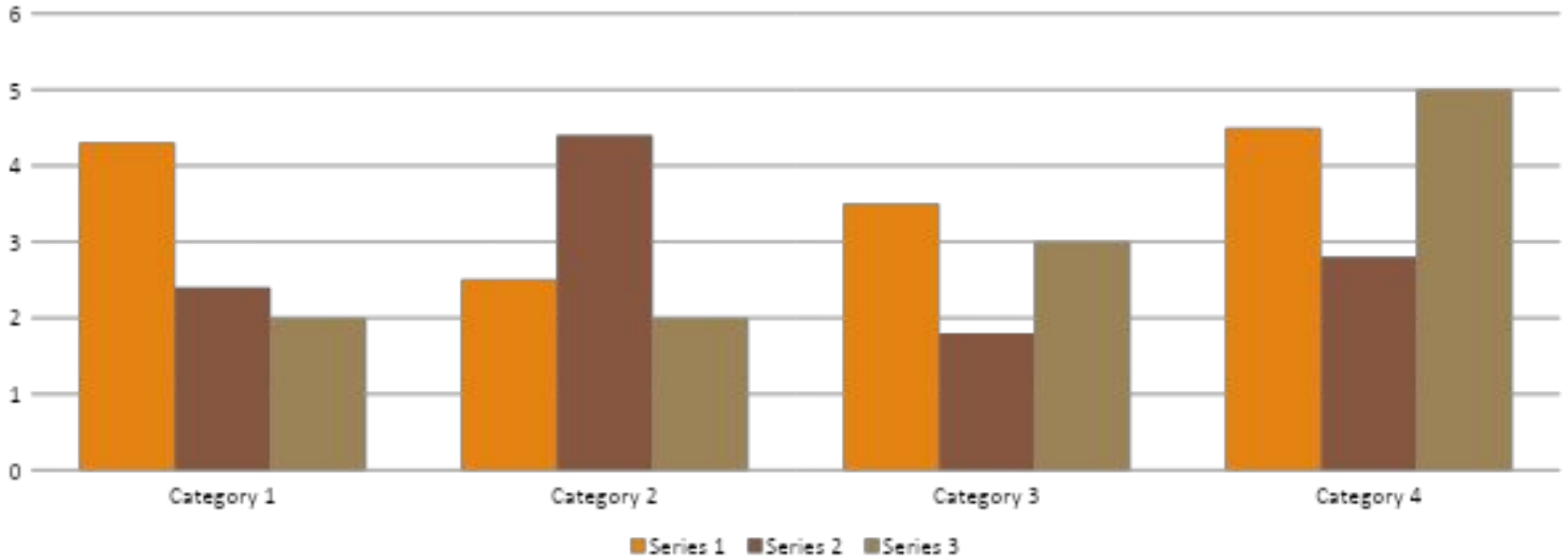

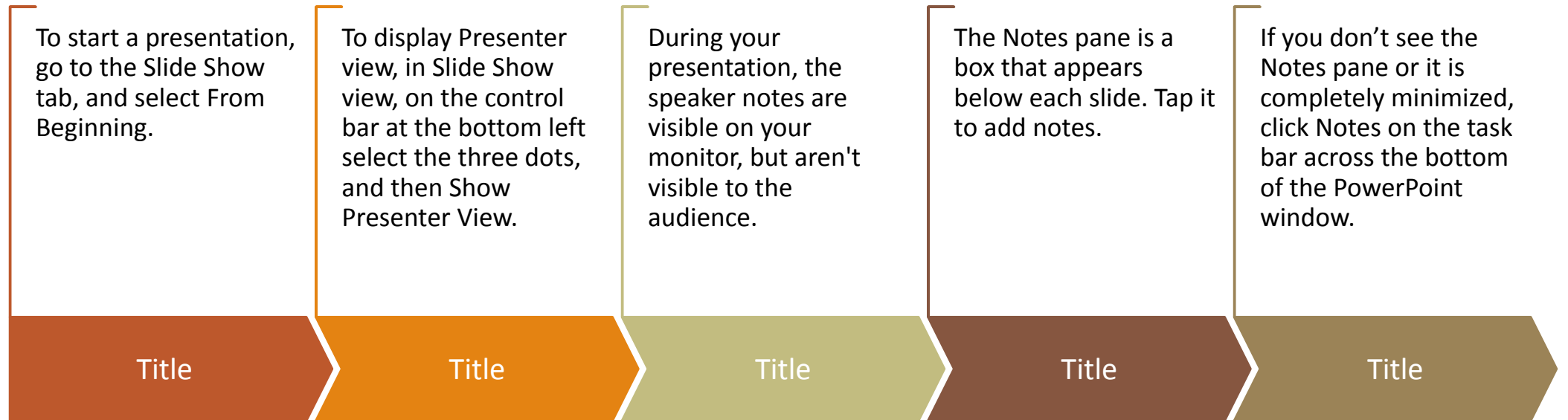
